LEGACY COMMITTEE

Although the Parade move to Mid-Town is not directly related to the Legacy Committee, it is indirectly related from the standpoint of involving the community for creation of the Western Heritage Month goal. The new route will be up South Virginia Street from Arroyo to California utilizing Forest Street and Arroyo as the main staging areas. This creates a major challenge for our parade volunteer group. We have some 40 street intersections and numerous business driveways and parking lots to control. Except for those committees that have activities occurring on Saturday morning, every Wrangler, Member and Director should be assisting with the Parade. If we are going to achieve our future goals, getting this parade route off on the right foot is essential to our success. So Chairman, please require your Wranglers and Members to help. Directors, you have a responsibility.

The Legacy Committee did meet in early May to discuss our progress on the timeline outlined in the Strategic Plan. The one immediate goal that has been achieved is the acquisition of offsite public parking. PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT



As the rodeo year comes to an end, my term as the Past Presidents' Representative to the Executive Committee is also coming to an end, and one last opportunity to get on my soap box and express my opinion.

One of the goals of the Strategic Plan was to engage and involve

our membership and Wrangler group. From this, one of the tasks was to create a mentorship program to assist in making our new Wranglers feel welcome and understand the workings and make-up of the Reno Rodeo Association. Chelsea Sidener and the RRT Committee took on that challenge and immediately created the mentorship program. Although 86% of our respondents to our February survey indicated they were willing to be more involved, when asked to be a mentor, only 12 of 50 Directors took on that responsibility.

What does it take to be a mentor? Make initial contact via email or telephone. Provide your phone number and email such that if the Wrangler has questions or needs information they have a point of contact to guide them in the right direction. Try to meet up with them at functions such as Work Day. That's pretty much it.

COUNT DOWN TO 100

Despite its success in terms of attendance and competition, 1922 was the last Reno Rodeo held until the early 1930s. Financial had taken their toll on the event. A carnival was brought to town in 1926 to help pay off a debt of \$900 still owed from the 1922 rodeo.

After a decade without a rodeo, Reno pulled out all stops in June 1932 with Pony Express Days, a three-day celebration including the biggest parade the city had ever seen. Hollywood celebrities and the top cowboys and cowgirls in the country came to Reno for the events.

The city was decorated in its Fourth of July splendor, with banners and window displays throughout the downtown corridor. The Reno Evening Gazette described the opening parade: "Hundreds of Reno residents and visitors were thronged along the line of march as cowboys, cowgirls, Indians and clowns swept by, mounted on the most impressive array of steeds ever exhibited in the city. The parade was more than a mile in length and included dude ranch sections, cowboys from western ranges, prominent state and city officials, celebrities and Indians clad in tribal regalia."

Nevada Gov. Fred Balzar and Lt. Gov. Morley Griswold held places of honors in the parade along with California Gov. James Rolph, Jr. and Will James, the cowboy artist and author who lived in Washoe Valley. Hollywood film stars including Rex Bell (long before his days as Nevada Lt. Gov.) Roscoe Turner, Harry Carr and others also participated.

In addition to the rodeo events first day highlights included trick roping by world champion Sam Garrett, who along with Jack Lindsley organized the entire Pony Express celebration.

More than 10,000 people attended the three-day show, and though expenditures far outdistanced gains, Garrett said the rodeo would definitely return the next year. It did, but on a much smaller scale. Among the champions of the 1932 rodeo were all-around champion Hub Whiteman of Clarksville, Texas; bronc rider Pete Knight, who rode the famed bucking horse Cannonball to a standstill; Richard Meredith in calf roping; E.E. Hill in bull riding and Hugh Bennett in steer wrestling. A motion picture truck from Hollywood was on hand to film the event for show in hundreds of movie theaters throughout the country.

Reno Rodeo Foundation Educational Scholarships

The Reno Rodeo Foundation Scholarship Committee, led by Chairman Jack Schroeder, recommended and received board approval to fund a total of \$47,000 to the following scholarship recipients. During this application cycle the foundation received 78 applications, from 13 northern Nevada counties. The following 23 students were selected based on their ranking which includes graduating from a northern Nevada high-school, full-time student enrollment in an accredited Nevada College or University, demonstrating financial need, scholastic proficiency, leadership and service activities.

RRF Quick Fact: By the end of our fiscal year, ending July 31, 2016, a total of \$77,500 will have been dispersed by the Reno Rodeo Foundation to support educational scholarship for students graduating from northern Nevada high-schools and attending Colleges and Universities in Nevada as full-time students.

After graduating from vet school in 2013, Ho moved back to Reno and has been practicing at Kings Row Pet Hospital ever since.


