


RENORODEO.COM—A NEW LOOK




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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I know you join me in my grief for Jerry and Sherri's family. None of us can really

comprehend what they are going through right now. My heart goes out to them and to the other families who have lost their loved ones in this tragedy.

This all happened during an otherwise great week for Reno Rodeo. We had several meetings with amazing, potential new sponsors, we had our monthly luncheon, we gave the Foundation a guarter of a million dollars, we had one of our most successful 100 Story events, and we were able to attend and support the next generation of rodeo athletes at the Sierra Nevada Jr. Rodeo and Gymkhana club awards banquet. All that good happened amidst our efforts to deal with the tragedy.

At the risk of sounding cliché, I do believe it is what Jerry and Sherri would want from us. Grieve for them, miss them, cherish and honor their memory, think of their family, while we keep moving forward to put on the 100-year celebration Reno Rodeo.

So, on that note...

We continue to work on getting all the necessary contracts in place, and that is our most important priority right now. As you know, there are a lot of moving parts, and many of those are taken care of by the people we hire and contract with. It is a big job, and we must be vigilant in our work to ensure we get what we need, while also protecting the interests of Reno Rodeo, now and in the future. We do not ever want to take a step back.

I have spoken before about having some targeted meetings on several topics and we have begun that process. We cannot

rest on our laurels. We always need to think about how we can do better, and you guys have those ideas. We just need to get them out on the table, and develop a plan to get them implemented. If you would like to have one of these meetings, work through your chairs, and we will get them set up.

Speaking of committee chairs, I do believe it is time to get you all together again to hear about all that is going on, and to give you a chance to let us all know what you have going, and if you need help, to find it for you. I will get a chair meeting together and announced soon. One of the most important topics will be budget management. You might be surprised what you hear from me!

As I start to visualize the sights and sounds of the rodeo (yes, I do dream about it!), I start to the think about how we will get it done. You, the volunteers, the committee members, are the life blood of Reno Rodeo. You make it happen—on so many levels and in so many ways. And we all have an impact on the experience our ticket buyers have. It still warms my heart when people tell me, "I love the rodeo!" That comes from having a great experience at the rodeo. Pretty simple. We all take on the responsibility to help every ticket buyer to have that kind of experience where they leave feeling great, because they just had a great time at the rodeo. From the minute they find a parking spot, to the minute they walk onto the grounds, while they are here, and as they leave, the entire experience is important. We all need to ensure that every time we encounter a ticket buyer, we should be doing everything we can to make their Reno Rodeo experience a great one.

Marjie has worked on the RR program for more than 20 years and served as the editor of the publication from 1997 to 2010. During that time, the Reno Rodeo program, now referred to as the magazine, became one of the best rodeo publications

COUNTDOWN TO 100

In 1975, famed western sculptor Robert MacFie Scriver was selected as grand marshal for the parade. Frank Groves was

the Reno Rodeo Association president and nearly \$200,000 was spent to build new stalls and improve the grandstands at the rodeo grounds. The rodeo parade had a patriotic theme, and the grand entry featured a giant unfolding Liberty Bell containing a horse and a flag girl holding an American flag. The rodeo queen was Kaylene Allen.

Inside the arena, the crowd and the media were firmly behind Battle Mountain cowboy Joe Marvel. Marvel had won the average in saddle bronc at the National Finals Rodeo the year before and fans were hoping for a strong showing at Reno. Though Marvel earned cheers on opening night with the second-highest score in saddle bronc, he didn't make it to the final go-round.

Bill Nelson ended up as the saddle bronc champion. The all-around champion was 19-year-old Clay Finley who also won the calf roping. Other winners included Buster Green in bareback, Randy Magers in steer wrestling, and Lindalee Whipple in barrel racing. The top team ropers were Howard Nichols and Carl Clark.

Cold and rainy weather hampered attendance at the rodeo, and the

association announced the event drew 22,500 fans, down from 28,000 the previous year. Still, Reno Rodeo president Frank

Groves announced all the businesses underwriting their rodeo had their investments returned in full.

Patriotism was again the theme for the 1976 rodeo as the United States celebrated its bicentennial. A horse owned by stock contractor Cotton Rosser jumped out of a giant birthday cake during the celebration. All the flag girls at the rodeo carried the "76" flag as part of the celebration.

Dom Azevedo was the Reno Rodeo Association president and Cindy Carlile the rodeo queen. Making his debut as the rodeo announcer was Bob Tallman, a former Winnemucca cowboy, and an up-andcoming announcer on the rodeo circuit.

The large rodeo parade also had a patriotic theme. Reno's Carol Grace dressed in a Betsy Ross costume and her horse had a Nevada license plate on his hind end that said "Betsy."

After the Saturday parade, Battle Mountain cowboy Dan Filipini stole the show in saddle bronc, winning the go-round with a score of 66 points, helping to set the stage for Sunday's finals.

Leo Camarillo, the veteran team and calf roper, earned allaround champion honors on Sunday, also winning the calf roping. That year, a set of silver spurs was presented to the winner of every event. Camarillo, in contention for the world all-around title, could not stay around for the awards ceremony, as he had to get to another rodeo. His sets of silver spurs were accepted by Fallon cowboy Anson Thurman. Other champions included the legendary Bruce Ford in bareback, Jack Roddy in steer wrestling, Denny Flynn in bull riding, and Marilyn Camarillo in barrel racing. The top team ropers were Jeff Barmby and Les Hirdes, while Bobby Brown and Kent Cooper tied for the saddle bronc championship.

HISTORY-RENO RODEO LIMITED EDITION ART PRINTS

WILDEST, RICHEST

My artwork inspiration for the 1988 poster came from Buckeye Blake's artwork he did for the Elko Cowboy Poetry in 1986. His style of old-time cowboys is what I wanted for my 1988 year.

My idea came from the artist who did a poster for Elko's Cowboy Poetry. I have always admired the old time rodeos. Will James did the first rodeo cover and Buckeye Blake's artwork depicted the same old style. I also chose Buckeye to do Cotton Rosser's bronze 26 years later.

This print was painted from a photo taken of me when I was arena director in the Grand Entry.

This print was a complete sellout, both our copies and the artist copy too.

RGJ story about Buckeye Blake

Buckeye Blake grew up in a home that was equal parts agriculture and artistry.

His father was a rodeo cowboy and rancher, his mother an artist, and young Buckeye took to

both vocations with a passion, while growing up on the family ranch outside Carson City in the late 1950s and early '60s.

He found another influential character in books — Will James, the Western author, and illustrator, who had once lived just to the north of Carson City in Washoe Valley.

"I had Will James books when I was a little kid," Blake said of the famed Western artist and author. "That's what ranching people gave their kids. When you're about 8 years old, you get a pony and then they give you Will James books. It was the book that a kid had to read to clue them in on the Wild West."

Will James died in 1942, four years before Blake was born, but both men are forever linked to the West — and closer to home, to the Reno Rodeo — through their art.

> "Buckeye has a lot of that same style that Will James did," said Grant Dalen, president of the Reno Rodeo Association.

Will James' pen-and-ink artwork decorated the program of the firstever Reno Rodeo (then called the Nevada Round-Up) in 1919. In 1988, Blake was the artist for the rodeo's limited-edition print and this year, his artistic involvement with the rodeo is going to a whole new level.

Blake has been "capturing souls" and being recognized for his artwork since his school days in Carson City. He left school during his junior year and moved to Hollywood, working in studios where he created movie

backdrops and art for animated films. He later returned to Nevada, he began selling his fine art through galleries.

Blake, who now lives in Weatherford, Texas, where he and his wife, Tona, raise quarter horses, also does paintings, leatherwork, pottery, furniture and more. He has created numerous posters over the years for the National Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko. In fact, that is where he and Grant Dalen met and where Dalen asked him to do the limitededition print for the Reno Rodeo in 1988.

Steve Walther 1989 Excerpts from RGJ

The Reno Rodeo wouldn't be complete without a great poster. The 1989 poster is a bronc rider, Butch Kelly, realistically portrayed by artist James Bama of Cody, Wyoming.

The painting was chosen from a selection of works by the Reno Rodeo Association.

Bama also painted the artwork for the 1982 poster, the first in an official Reno Rodeo collector series of eight numbered, limitededition prints.

Bama's work appeared in most major western collections, including the Cowboy Hall of Fame and Gene Autry Museum and in private collections like those of Malcolm Forbes, Jack Nicholson, and Burt Reynolds.



Bama's illustrations have appeared on covers of Reader's Digest, Saturday Evening Post, and many Bantam books. Many of Bama's original works were handled exclusively by Big Horn Gallery in Cody, Wyoming.

The Reno Rodeo is heralded as a boon to businesses throughout northwest Nevada. "There's a substantial economic benefit to the community," said Steve Walther, a Reno attorney and rodeo president for 1988-1989.

In 1989 the Reno Rodeo made a great impact with its new Cowboy Country Store which was comprised of up to

PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT




Sorry I missed last month's BullSheet, we had technical difficulties, as our computer was down for three weeks.




