

# THE PONY EXPRESS RIDES AGAIN!

A trail of dust appears in the distance as a young, weathered rider emerges across rolling hills of cheatgrass and sagebrush. The sounds of the exhausted man and his animal break the tranquility of this peaceful scene as they finish their leg of the rugged trail. A new rider and horse stand in the shade of an old cottonwood, anxiously awaiting their exchange. The incoming rider brings his horse to an abrupt halt. Getting down from his mount, he lifts a mochila (leather mailbag) from the saddle. The fresh rider then places it on the new horse. He steps into the stirrup, climbs atop the saddle, and with a swift jab of his spurs begins his stake of the journey.

There were limitations on how we kept in contact from coast to coast prior to railroad and telegraph lines criss crossing our beautiful country. The Pony Express was created to fill this gap by providing mail delivery with continuous horse-and-rider relays between St. Joseph, Missouri, and Sacramento, California, from April 1860 to October 1861.

The breed of the horses used varied according to the terrain. Most common were half-breed Mustangs in the west; in the east, it was Thoroughbred / Morgan. The horses that they used would prove to be very valuable as they were faster and demonstrated better stamina than most Indian mounts. This was a significant concern due to the likelihood of a hostile attack while on the trail. These horses often saved the lives of riders who were able to outdistance

their attackers.

Of course, the best horses were of no use without experienced riders. The business of the Pony Express sought out young men born to the saddle and undaunted by danger.

They were generally slight of build to minimize the strain on their mounts.

Despite being a brief, financially disastrous enterprise, the Pony Express employed a few famous riders, including William "Buffalo Bill" Cody and Robert "Pony Bob" Haslam.

Though the original Pony Express went belly up due to

the advancement in communication technologies, the legacy continues on in what they call a Re-Ride.

Each June, over 750 members of the National Pony Express Association (NPEA) reenact the Pony Express in a Commemorative Re-Ride over a ten-day period. Letters are carried in a mochila over the original trail. The 1,966 mile ride covers eight states and is conducted 24 hours a day until the mail is delivered to its destination, either Sacramento, or Saint

Joseph (alternating annually). The national Re-Ride event is an opportunity for young and old to ride the historic trail, and to send a letter via the Pony Express.

This year the Reno Rodeo will have a special performance depicting the hand-off of mail, as well as a unique tie-in with our military veterans on Patriot Night.

Letters to veterans will be delivered and presented to the Veteran's Coalition during The Pony Express performance on Patriot Night, showing how it was done in the Wild West.

## **GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE**



Recently, the officers and I, went to Nashville, Tennessee, to take a trip to Lynchburg, and tour the Jack Daniels distillery. The reason behind this trip was to choose the whiskey, from a newly tapped barrel, to bottle for sale in a commemorative gift pack specifically for this 100-year rodeo.

The day after our arrival in Tennessee, we were picked up and shuttled

to Lynchburg (about and hour away) through rolling pastures, woods, and limestone out crops. The tour began at the main grounds of Jack Daniels' original homestead. After stepping out of his office (complete with the safe he kicked and injured himself on), we were taken to where they make charcoal. They burn pallets of wood in a very specific process that includes excess white lightning and water. The results of this procedure are eventually used for the filtration of the whiskey.

From there, we strolled by the opening in the rock wall where the actual water they use in making their whiskey flows out of their cave spring.

Next, it was on to the huge vats of mash that ferment until there are no more "bubbles" popping. After that it was on to the filtration system that is the key to Jack Daniels being what it is! In this building are more huge vats filled almost to the top with the smaller burned wood pieces made earlier. At the top is a drip system. The whiskey flows through and down to the bottom.

Another notable element that is key to Jack Daniels, are the barrels the whiskey is stored in until it's ready to be bottled. The barrels are so crucial to Jack Daniels, that they make their own barrels in two privately owned "cooperages".

When we left one of the many warehouses holding hundreds of aging whiskey barrels (note: they do not rotate their barrels), it was on to the bottling room. And on that day, they were putting labels on bottles heading to China, Russia, Germany and Poland.

We were then taken to the important tasting room, where we were given instruction on how to choose the whiskey; look, smell, and then taste. Before we left to head to downtown Lynchburg to have a homestyle dinner at "Ms. Bobo's," and shop the Jack Daniels gift store, we were given an extra special treat: touring the infamous underground cave!! This cave is seldomly visited by any other than Jack Daniels employees. It is locked and surveilled, as it is the main source of their water. Some openings inside have been geologically surveyed and are a mile deep or longer. The last stop on the tour was the mountain top lodge/event's area that looks down on the valley below.

If you find yourself in Tennessee, and have the chance to take this tour, you certainly should! You will have a greater understanding of the whiskey making process and the passion of the people behind it. There is so much more information, and there are so many interesting facts that I have no room for and can't remember!

Enjoy Jack Daniels more with this knowledge, and be ready to buy your gift pack when it goes on sale.



## WE ARE THE RENO RODEO -DAN EHORN

Born and raised on the west side of the Nevada, California state-line, Dan Ehorn can remember visiting Reno, and its wild and rich rodeo, from his earliest days. "I remember in my younger years when Mom, Dad, my brother and I would come to Reno, stay at the Mapes, shop for clothes at Parker's Western Wear, and attend the Reno Rodeo," Dan fondly recalled.

Dan was very active while growing up in Red Bluff. He

participated in the Future Farmers Association, raising livestock, and he also participated in several high school sports. "This past year, our football team was inducted into the Red Bluff Spartan Hall of Fame for being undefeated in Northern Athletic League, and Northern Interstate League Champion."

In addition to football, Dan also competed in rodeo in high school, considering his rodeo relationships as his most dear. "I have spent all of my life around ranching and rodeos. I started rodeoing in high school, moved on to amateur, and then professional rodeos. I was a bull rider,

and also rode bareback," Dan stated. "I grew up with Johnny Growney, and I've known Cotton Rosser all of my life."

It was through a relationship with Bob Britton that Ehorn first got involved in the Reno Rodeo. "I became a member of the Washoe County Sheriff's Search and Rescue in the early '80s where I meant Bob Britton," Ehorn said. "He and Harvey Fenton got me involved in the Reno Rodeo. I did three years as a wrangler before becoming a member." Ehorn went on to become a director in 2000 where he still serves today.

In addition to serving on over a dozen committees, and chairing the Grounds and Capital Improvements Committee over the years, Ehorn is most proud of all the carpentry work he has participated in over the years. A carpenter by trade, Ehorn has been involved in multiple renovations and improvements around the grounds. "When I was the grounds chairman, we built grandstand four and five box seats, and constructed the top of the dugout so people would not fall

into it. I remodeled Bob Tallman's announcer booth; the area behind the bucking chutes; the old Reno Rodeo office. I have been the all-around carpenter since joining," he explained.

Recognizing the importance of including everyone in the rodeo fun, Dan has an affinity for the Special Kids' Rodeo and Mutton Busting events. "To see the expressions on all the little cowboy's and cowgirl's faces as they perform is great. I love


helping to bring their little dreams to life." Additionally, Dan loves to work around the animals and counts some of his best experiences working the stripping chutes. "I remember I got to show my ability in close quarters as I came face to face with a bull. ## **COUNTDOWN TO 100**

In 1977, the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. was heavily involved as a sponsor of the pro rodeo with its annual Winston Awards. Reno was the designated site for the presentation of the awards for the first half of the rodeo season. Each event leader would receive a bonus check of \$2,500, which would be presented during the Reno Rodeo. Reno Rodeo Association President Frank Knafelc said having the awards would virtually guarantee every top cowboy in the country would come to the Reno Rodeo. Assured of being in attendance were Miss Winston, Cindy Alexander, and her husband Joe, the great bareback rider.

The rodeo was expanded to six performances, and the opening performance on Wednesday night was designated as "Family Night." Wilbur Plaugher was back as the rodeo clown after a five-year absence, and spent some time opening night showing off a picture of himself in the rodeo program that showed him as a bronc rider in the 1940s. "I used to ride in all events, but I'm mostly clowning now," Plaugher told a Nevada State Journal reporter. The legendary Casey Tibbs was in town to promote the rodeo, and also took part in the parade. The rodeo queen was Teresa Pratt.

Opening night drew an overflow crowd of 8,500 for family night, and more than 1,000 people had to be turned away at the gates. The Journal reported that cars were backed up from the Fairgrounds to the Wells Avenue overpass.

A new event this year was actually the return of an old event – the wild horse race. "It seemed to be a crown pleaser," publicity director Ken Dennis said. "It's a rough action thing. More men get hurt than horses."

Joe Marvel, the Battle Mountain bronc rider, turned in a spectacular ride in the championship go-round on Sunday

Another Battle Mountain resident, Christi Venturacci won the barrel racing. Fallon's DeMar Thurman captured the title in the steer wrestling. Other champions included Jack Ward in bareback and Bill Nelson in bull riding. Corky Warren and Ed Herdis tied for first in the calf roping. Reg and Leo Camarillo were the champion team ropers.

The Rodeo Association said 40,000 fans attended the event, with opening night and the Sunday finals announced as complete sellouts.

Fans returned in droves to the 1978 rodeo, as well, with average attendance about 7,800 for the five days of competition. Only the Saturday afternoon show, when the Washoe zephyrs were howling from the west, failed to sell out. William Elwell was the rodeo association president, and Reno attorney Paul Richards was the first vice president. Genny Buttram, a University of Nevada student, was the rodeo queen.

Richards spent part of the rodeo dressed up in a "Black Bart" clown suit. He provided some comic relief to the crowd, but did suffer a painful experience in the process. The Nevada State Journal explained it this way: "No serious injuries to the riders or stock were reported during the rodeo although a number of cowboys were seen limping from the arena...Richards himself may have been one of the most grievously injured when, with a dash of over-exuberance on the part of the costumers, his Black Bart clown suit was overloaded a bit with an explosive charge that, in his own words, 'singed my rear end a bit."

Inside the arena, there were some memorable performances, especially in the saddle bronc, where Canadian cowboy Wilf Hyland scored an 87 in the championship go-round, one of the highest totals ever in the event at the Reno Rodeo. Hyland's ride was good enough to give him the championship, by a point, over former world champion, "Monty Hawkeye" Henson, and Bill Pauley.

California cowboy Dudley Little captured the all-around title, and also won day money for Sunday's short go-round with the fastest times in steer wrestling and team roping.

The bareback competition featured a pair of future PRCA Hall of Famers battling for the title. In the end, Bruce Ford edged Joe Alexander by three points to claim the championship.

It was a year for ties in several other events. A three-way split in bull riding saw Hall of Famer Donny Gay share the title with Brad Richman and Jerry Beagley. In calf roping, Pax Irvine and Lyle Cochran split the winnings, and in steer wrestling, C.R. Jones, Jack Hannum, and Dan Torricellas all finished with identical times.

Julio Moreno, a longtime pick-up man at the Reno Rodeo, teamed with Denny Watkins to win the team roping overall title. Gail Tyson won the barrel racing.

### Jim Caselli, Reno **Rodeo 1986 President**



The painting is a graphic illustration of the tension, strength,









## TRIP TO JACK DANIELS TO PICK A BARREL OF WHISKEY

Josh, George, and I, along with Jamie, Jenn, and Shannon, made a trip to Lynchburg, Tennessee, on January 24th to pick out a barrel of Jack Daniels for our 100-year celebration. Mike was not able to make the trip, but his words to us before we left were "choose wisely." The pressure was on.

The tour of the Jack Daniels facility was very informative. We learned they make their own charcoal to filter the whiskey using sugar maple wood. They use a fire extinguisher filled with 140 proof whiskey as the starter fluid. Josh and George got a little sprayed on their fingers to taste. I was listening to our tour guide and missed out. They said it was really smooth. The key to the charcoal is the timing in adding the water.

Tennessee has a lot of limestone, and as the water passes thru the limestone the iron gets filtered out. No iron in the water makes for a better product. The whiskey is filtered through ten feet of charcoal. For the Gentleman Jack brand they filter it again through another three feet of charcoal.

They make approximately 2200 of their own oak barrels a day, and they only use a barrel once. They burn the inside of the barrels— but for how long and at what temperature is a tight-lipped secret.

When the barrels are full, they are put into barrel houses. These are not climate-controlled. Once the barrels are placed in the racks of the barrel house, the barrels are never rotated, and they stay in the same position until they are removed for bottling.

The barrels that are placed at the top of the house and on the sides will get a greater fluctuation in temperature throughout the year causing the wood to expand and contract more than the barrels that are in the middle. This allows the whiskey to move in and out of the wood giving different tastes to the whiskey in different barrels. We were shown a couple of barrel slats. There were lines in the wood showing how deep the whiskey had penetrated. This is why Jack Daniels single barrel whiskey may not taste the same from one bottle to another.

If you look at the label on a bottle of single barrel, it will have a barrel number on it. If you like that bottle you can look for that barrel number on another bottle and it will taste the same. If you have a bottle from a different barrel number if may have a slightly different taste. They get about 240 bottles out of a barrel.

Our taste master, Goose, was very entertaining, and made our tasting experience quite enjoyable. His job of whiskey taster is one I would really enjoy. Goose, and the barrel man, Kevin, had samples from three different barrels for us to choose from. Mike's words of "choose wisely" were now resonating in our heads. The samples were labeled "37", "40", and "42." Goose had our group try each sample one at a time, and make notes on each. Goose asked each of us to pick the one we liked the best. Samples 40 and 42 were the favorites; no one picked 37.

He then had us do another tasting after adding four drops of

water to each sample. That changed the character of each one, and number 37 became the favorite. Our group was amazed how four little drops of water could change the character so much.

I was able to bring the sample bottle of number 37 home for Mike to taste. Mike sampled it, and gave us the thumbs up on the choice. Once we receive our bottles, buy one, try it, and let us know how you like it.

After the tasting we were treated to an authentic, and very

tasty southern lunch, at Miss Mary Bobo's boarding House. After lunch, we were given the opportunity to visit the cave their water source comes through. It is not normally open to the public. There we learned that Jack Daniels is a 97 percent recyclable company. The used barrels are sent to England, or to wineries for use in their aging processes. The charcoal is sent to Kingsford, and the left-over mash is used to feed livestock.

Our group was treated extremely well by all the people we came in contact with, and we had a thoroughly enjoyable time.




